Talented Big Reds a likely choice to repeat success of 2010-11

What does a coach ask of his defending Class B state champion basketball team.

If you are Sexton boys basketball coach Carlton Valentine you ask the Big Reds players to stay humble, respect the game, respect your opponent, work hard in practice and in school and be a good person in pursuit of everyday life.

Wow! One gets the impression, Valentine is talking about more than just basketball.

"Of course, let us be reminded these are kids we're talking about. They forget. A coach needs to remind them," Valentine said.

What the coach doesn't need reminding of is that he has more talent on his roster than arguably any school in the state in any class.

There is 6-6 guard Denzel Valentine who is Michigan State bound; Anthony Clemons (6-1) who is headed off for Iowa and Bryan Forbes, a 6-3 guard who is signed with Cleveland State.

"You can have talented players but without chemistry you have nothing," Valentine warns. "To pick up where they left off they will need to get along, share with each other and help one another out."

While Sexton's style will be the same, there will be some new faces including 6-8 freshman forward Trevor Manuel and senior transfer (Grand Rapid Forest Hills Northern) David Washington.

So how does this Sexton team top last year's championship season?

It doesn't.

"That was last year.. 51 years in the making. These boys are creating their own team. Each



group is different. The dynamic changes," Valentine explains.

Sexton will play in the Capital Area Activities Conference's Blue Division where it (Class B) is grouped with all Class A schools.

"It's a tough league," Sexton's coach concludes. One it will have to conquer to get to where this Sexton club wants to be.

Sexton girls work to improve win total in 2011-12

Wins for the Lansing Sexton girls basketball program were at a minimum in 2010-11.

Behind the senior leadership and play of senior guards, Sophia Morrell and Cornesha Gund, the Big Reds will look to build and make improvements on their 1-20 season a year ago.

"We have a total of six seniors returning from a year ago," said Sexton girls basketball coach Joe Wojda. "The girls work hard and play hard, but we're not really skilled."

Sexton will attempt to use its quickness to get out and run and try to get easy, quick baskets off their presses and quick traps.

"Ideally, we want to create turnovers," Wojda said. "We will also need our best players, Morrell and Gund to score 12-15 points a game."

The Big Reds' struggles over the last five years have extended beyond offense and defense. Keeping a full roster of players to finish a season may be the most perplexing challenge.

"Last year we couldn't run some drills because of roster numbers. We've got to find a way to keep the girls' interest while improving our play and developing our skills," said Wojda. "Girls basketball in the suburbs is thriving. Here, we struggle with interest and keeping the girls involved."

The result has been a dwindling youth program.

"The good players are now leaving inner city schools and going different places. Twenty years ago there was loyalty and girls couldn't wait to play for Sexton, Eastern and Everitt," explains Wojda. "Now, it's who's best and where do I go to fit in."

The goal in 2011-12 is to win more games and return the girls basketball interest back to the urban areas and not necessarily in that order.
